Thanks to all those who helped by writing to their State Representatives and Senators urging support for legislation that would modify the sales tax distribution system in St. Louis County. By the time this issue arrives in your mailbox, we will know the outcome. At this point, we are guardedly optimistic and hopeful that meaningful change will occur. Just this week,

we had the opportunity to testify before the Ways and Means Committee of the State House of Representatives. I had never been in the Capitol before and can tell you that it was quite an experience. In the event we are not successful this year, we will continue the effort, because it is such an important issue ... and the current system is just wrong and certainly not sustainable.

### Do you know your City Council rep?

The City Council is a legislative body whose members make important decisions that affect our everyday lives and the community we live in, having your best interests in mind. They make decisions on significant matters such as development of the City, public safety issues and spending funds wisely so that the residents have the most benefits from roadways, parks and other amenities. You may find it interesting to know that as the Mayor, I only get to vote if there is a tie, which is rare. Although there are veto procedures, a veto can be overridden with six of the eight Councilmembers' votes.

The reason I bring this topic to mind is to remind each of you that it is important to know your Councilmembers and give them your perspective on issues that may affect our city. I believe it is imperative that we have elected leaders who are willing to make hard decisions through their votes, as opposed to taking the easy route in order to be popular. You can easily find your Councilmember using the "Resident Information" portal on our website, found at the top of the "Quick Links" section of our home page. Just type in your address, and you'll find what ward you live in, your trash pick-up day and parcel number, among other information. You can then reference the City Council section of the website to see the City Council reps in that ward and how to contact them. They will be happy to hear from you, as am I.

Our Council is made up of eight members (two from each Ward). They are elected for a period of two years, and each year one of the two positions from each ward is up for election. There are four committees of council, and those Committees are consensus-building, in nature, with committee recommendations being forwarded to City Council for final

mouth-watering St. Louis favorites will be available. Feel free to bring lawn chairs, blankets and refreshments (please no glass bottles).

Parking is provided on the lots surrounding Chesterfield Mall, with handicap parking available. Shuttle buses will be traveling on Chesterfield Center Drive with stops where people can board to the viewing area. Shuttle buses equipped to handle wheelchairs will also be available.

The Fireworks Celebration is free to the public. This celebration is presented by the City of Chesterfield and sponsored in part by the Chesterfield Mall, Sachs Properties, Jim Butler KIA, and Commerce Bank.

### It's against the law

A Chesterfield ordinance has long prohibited individuals from either selling or discharging fireworks, except by permit. Fireworks can be dangerous at times and can cause both personal injury and property damage.

It is unlawful for any person to manufacture, sell, offer for sale, ship or cause to be shipped into Chesterfield, any item of fireworks. This section applies to nonresidents as well as residents of the City.

It is also against the law for any person to explode, ignite or discharge any articles of fireworks within the city limits.

the Planning & Public Works Committee and the Finance & Administration Committee of Council. She served as chairperson of the latter committee for three years.

Durrell has been a champion in preserving the history of Chesterfield by serving on the Chesterfield Historical and Landmarks Preservation Commission from 1990 to 1999, and again from 2008 to the present, serving as Chairperson for three of those years. While serving in this role, she worked to save the historic Farmer's Bank Building at the corner of Baxter and Old Chesterfield Road when the Baxter Road extension was constructed. She was also the editor and wrote two chapters of the historical book, "Chesterfield: From Untamed Wilderness to Thriving Municipality."

Lynne Johnson stated in her nomination of Durrell that "she is an energizing force in the Chesterfield Historic and Landmarks Preservation Committee, always volunteering to take on and complete responsibilities that others do not. She is a source of information on both the Chesterfield of today and of old, and enthusiastically inspires all of us."

## Police Department follows the City in celebrating its first quarter century

The City of Chesterfield celebrated 25 years in 2013. This year, it's the police department's turn.

Chesterfield Police was formalized a year after the City under the direction of Ray Johnson.

On June 1, 1989, Chief Johnson conducted his department's first roll call, sending 49 officers out to patrol the streets of Chesterfield. In 2003, the department received international accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Accreditation (CALEA) after adhering to standards that further the department's professional level of service. And in 2012, Chesterfield Police was named a Flagship Agency of CALEA, receiving a perfect score – the first agency to achieve this!

Several members of the command staff have graduated from the FBI National Academy, and officers have received numerous awards for dealing with a variety of police-related issues, including dealing with the mentally ill, community policing and involvement in regional task forces.

Johnson remains at the helm of the department, which now includes nearly 90 commissioned officers and is celebrating its first quarter century.

## Safety Town gears up for summer sessions

Safety Town is a nationally recognized pre-school safety program that teaches 4-6 year olds about a wide variety of safety issues, including bicycle safety, water safety, school bus safety and stranger danger. The program includes classroom activities, as well as outside hands-on activities in the miniature Safety Town city. The program is hosted and staffed by the Chesterfield Police Department in cooperation with the Chesterfield Rotary and the Chesterfield Kiwanis.

The program is conducted in six, two-week sessions during the summer months. Safety Town is one of the department's most popular programs. In addition to commissioned police officers, the Safety Town staff includes teen

counselors from area middle and senior high schools who assist the police officers in leading the program. The sessions are as follows:

# Sewer problems? Lateral repair program can save residents big bucks

Did you know that the City of Chesterfield administers a program, which covers up to \$15,000 in eligible costs for sewer lateral repairs?

This program is funded through an annual assessment to Chesterfield residents of \$28 per year, which is included in your total tax bill. The program covers the portion of the sanitary sewer that extends from the building foundation to the connection at the MSD sewer or a septic tank.

If you are experiencing a problem with your sewer lateral line, the first step is to contact a licensed plumber to have the line cabled. If the sewer lateral cannot be opened, or if the plumber indicates that there are problems with the lateral, contact Chesterfield Public Services at 636.537.4762. If you qualify, the City will contact its plumbing contractor to have your sewer lateral investigated utilizing a camera. City Staff will review the video, and any eligible deficiency will be corrected up to a total cost of \$15,000.

The program application and policy/procedures document can be obtained at City Hall from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. These documents also are online at [www.chesterfield.mo.us](http://www.chesterfield.mo.us). The application fee was recently reduced to \$100 to make this program more affordable for residents.

## Residential Street Tree Planting Program's goal is to replace declining trees between residential streets and city sidewalks.

The Residential Street Tree Planting Program provides for the planting of trees within City right-of-way (the space between the sidewalk and the street) along public residential streets.

In many areas of Chesterfield, street trees are declining in health due to age and health issues related to overpopulation of a few species. In a typical year, the City of Chesterfield removes approximately 500 street trees that are dead, hazardous, in poor health, or otherwise poorly located. Through the planting program, the City plants approximately 150-200 trees per year. The net effect is that the number of trees along residential streets is being reduced.

Trees provide significant economic, functional, and structural benefits that help improve the quality of life, real estate value, and sense of community. Street trees benefit all residents.

Although the City of Chesterfield does not require that residents replace most street trees when they are removed, the City does take pride in its tree-lined streets. It is our hope that most residents share this pride and similarly do not want to see the number of

street trees reduced. It is for these reasons that the City of Chesterfield offers the Residential Street Tree Planting Program.

The program makes affording and planting street trees easy.

Street trees are planted through the program each spring and fall. If a resident has adequate space for a new street tree, an application can be submitted at anytime. In order to receive a street tree this fall, the deadline for applications is Aug. 31.

# Baxters, Beckemeiers were among Chesterfield pioneers

*One in a series of stories spotlighting Chesterfield's pioneer families.*

## Baxter

As you travel around Chesterfield, you will see the Baxter name on roads, subdivisions, apartment complexes, and businesses. Have you ever wondered who Baxter was?

Greene Berry Baxter, his wife Mourning Jones Baxter, and his 8-year-old son John moved from Kentucky to Missouri in 1818. Baxter purchased land at the intersection of present day Clayton and Baxter roads, the latter being named in his honor.

A Chesterfield connection was created when, in 1836, John settled on a farm located near Clarkson and Baxter roads. He continued to live on the farm after his marriage to Nancy Sappington in 1841. The next year, their son Hartley Sappington Baxter was born, followed by a daughter, Mourning Baxter, 17 months later.

John Baxter was one of the early settlers who helped build the Old Bonhomme Presbyterian Church on Conway Road. After his death on Sept. 10, 1844, he was buried in the Bonhomme churchyard, but his name lives on in Old Baxter Road, Baxter Lakes subdivision, Baxter Crossings Apartments, Baxter Gardens (landscaping company), among other sites located in Chesterfield.

## Beckemeier

August G. Beckemeier (b. 1867) is another family name commemorated in Chesterfield.


Beckemeier and his wife purchased a farm at 14415 Olive Street Road (Olive Boulevard today) from Charles Ober in 1903. The property included a small house near the road and a larger main residence behind it.

The Beckemeiers raised corn, wheat, potatoes, and hay along the Missouri River bottoms and grain, fruit trees and berries on the hill. Additionally, they raised chickens and peacocks.

After their daughter, Minna, married Fred Waldmann, the newlyweds lived in the Beckemeier home with Minna's parents. August died in 1957, but the Waldmanns continued to farm and raise peacocks. Their peacock flock swelled to 150 birds.

In May 1997, Minna presented the 54-acre farm to the Missouri Department of Conservation, per her father's request. On 45 acres of woodlands and 9 acres of grasslands, the state created the August G. Beckemeier Conservation Area, which offers a hiking trail, viewing bench, picnic table, and small parking lot.

The Beckemeiers and Waldmanns are buried in the St. John's United Church of Christ cemetery. However, the Beckemeier name lives on in Chesterfield.

## Audubon Society recommends keeping cats indoors to prevent hunting, killing of wild birds

Many of you enjoy watching the courtship and nesting behavior from our native songbirds and may feed, provide water or have a native plant habitat in your landscape. To help protect the birds we enjoy watching, please consider keeping your cat indoors. It will benefit the cats, as well as the birds for the following reasons:

- Cats allowed outdoors risk attack by other cats, dogs and injury from cars and other vehicles.

- Cats allowed outdoors are much more likely to contract feline leukemia, distemper and other diseases.

- Cats allowed outdoors may bring ticks, mites, fleas and other pests into your home.

- Free-roaming cats will hunt birds and other small animals on instinct, regardless of appetite.

- Cats are stealth/ambush predators and can effectively hunt, even when declawed.

- Collars with bells have little benefit as birds have no reason to associate the ringing with danger.

- A recent report by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute estimates 2.4 billion birds are killed in the U.S. annually by free-roaming cats.

## New Book traces the namesake of Faust Park

One was a St. Louis saloon-keeper who built a prosperous restaurant business. One became a wealthy capitalist with a fashionable West End mansion. Another moved out of the city and became a successful farmer, whose land would one day honor his family's legacy: Faust Park.

*Oysters to Angus: Three Generations of the St. Louis Faust Family* (Bluebird Publishing) is a new book by local author Elizabeth Terry about the legendary family which helped shape St. Louis history. Published during the 250th anniversary of the city's founding, this as-yet untold story traces the Faust family from patriarch Tony Faust to son Edward Faust and grandson Leicester Faust.

Filled with historic photos and a colorful narrative, the book begins with Tony Faust's entry into the rough and rowdy St. Louis in the mid-1800's. Fleeing Germany like many others after the failed Revolution of 1848, Tony "clawed his way to social and financial standing by way of good investments, good humor and good luck," Terry writes. His son Edward became a wealthy industrialist, eager to shed his second-generation German immigrant status as World War I raged overseas.

Finally, Edward's son, Leicester, fled the city and established a self-sustaining farm in what is now Chesterfield. After building a successful agri-business, the Fausts donated 98.5 acres to St. Louis County in 1968 for the park, which bears the family name.

Terry is a St. Louis historian, researcher and writer. She holds a Master's in public history from James Madison University and directs the archives for a St. Louis church, Salem United Methodist. This is her first book.
