Chesterfield City Council Awards 2008 Citizen of the Year to Kathy Higgins

he Chesterfield City Council has named Kathy Higgins as its 2008 Citizen of the Year. Selection Committee presented recommendation to the Council following their review of several nominations. Mayor John Nations presented Mrs. Higgins with the award at the City's Citizens Recognition event, a bi-annual event to recognize all citizen volunteers.

Citizens of the Year are recognized for their benefit to the City of Chesterfield through volunteerism, working on community projects, and overall civic contributions to the community. Mrs. Higgins is the president of Sachs Properties, which is the master developer of 1,500 acres at the urban core of the City, known as Chesterfield Village. Mrs. Higgins has served on the Chesterfield Beautification Committee and is the recent past-president of the Chesterfield Arts board. She also serves on the boards of Stages St. Louis, the Faust Cultural Heritage Foundation, the St. Louis County Library and is associated with several other local boards and organizations.



Mayor Nations recognized Mrs. Higgins for her efforts in initiating the plantings in the highway right-of-ways in Chesterfield, for her numerous other civic contributions to work toward the beautification of the City, and the promotion and advancement of public art. "We are fortunate to have a volunteer and leader such as Kathy in Chesterfield. Her efforts have been instrumental in beautifying the City and making it a welcoming place for residents and visitors," stated Mayor Nations.

Other nominees for Citizen of the Year were Rosalie Bergh and Don Wiegand.

MAYOR'S LETTER

n April 22nd it was my great privilege to be sworn in for my third term as your Mayor. Having held this office for eight years and on the threshold of a new term, there is probably very little that I could say about my policies and priorities that would be new to you. I am proud of our many accomplishments and I look forward with great anticipation to all that can be accomplished in the next four years. I consider it one of the great privileges of my life to serve as your Mayor.

Eight years ago, our City faced many challenges. Then, as now, we faced an economy which presented challenges at every turn and many of the decisions we faced were difficult. But then, as now, I believed that our opportunities were more than sufficient to confront our challenges.

Beginning in 2001 with the worst financial crisis the City had faced in its brief history and the real threat that for the first time services might have to be reduced because of the downturn in the economy at that time, the voters approved Proposition P which provided a dedicated funding source for our parks and recreation programs. Managing those dollars very carefully, we have not only put the City in a very strong financial position, but have simultaneously built parks and recreation programs and amenities which are the envy of the region. We now have thousands of people of all ages and all abilities participating in our parks programs while building an extensive trail and sidewalk network throughout the City. We have acquired, and will continue to acquire, land for our parks to preserve our open spaces for all time. We have partnered with STAGES St. Louis to reach some of our young people with limited abilities to access recreation programs We have also partnered with through musical theater. Chesterfield Arts to enhance the City with public art exhibitions of many types, and you will see much more in the next few years.

We have reorganized the City government to improve its efficiency and effectiveness. We created the Parks and Recreation Department to separate that important function from the Public Works Department. Public Works, in turn, has been merged with the Planning Department to create what is now the Department of Planning and Public Works thereby bringing greater efficiency to all aspects of the interconnected responsibilities of planning, building, and maintaining our City and its vital infrastructure. In many ways, the services of this new combined department touch your lives everyday. From the quality of the streets and sidewalks, to snow removal, to planning and managing traffic patterns, to improving our daily commutes, to planning for the sustainable business and residential development of Chesterfield; much of what you see and enjoy everyday in terms of the appearance, maintenance, and sustainability of our City is the result of the work of the Planning and Public Works Department.

We have established the Office of Community Services and Economic Development to be very pro-active in reaching out to our residents, employers, civic partners, and other governmental entities. Through this office we have greatly expanded our outreach to the community and region and in many ways enhanced the vital communications necessary to accommodate the many important concerns on every issue confronting us. This enhanced communication and partnership outreach has

improved the decision making and responsiveness of your City government.

Our Police Department earned International Accreditation in 2003, which was renewed in 2006 and again in 2009. This year the Department earned re-accreditation based on a



review of more than 400 police standards without a single deficiency. I was told by the Commission on Accreditation that never in their careers had they seen a review as exemplary as that given to the Chesterfield Police Department and further designated the Department as a "Flagship Agency" in terms of International Accreditation.

We have started such important community events as the July 4th celebration, which has quickly grown into what is now considered to be one of the largest and best in the region. Look for it again this year – and every year.

I am well aware that the financial position of the City is on the minds of many, but I am pleased to report that our financial position is very strong. We work very hard when the economy is good to prepare for challenging days like these and we are well positioned in these troubled times. In fact, we have been bucking the trend of most governments and have actually reduced the Chesterfield portion of your property tax rate 72% over the past eight years, while expanding and improving every area of our operation as well as building a substantial fund reserve to weather difficult times. There will be no layoffs and no service cutbacks in Chesterfield and you will continue to enjoy the quality municipal services you have come to expect and enjoy.

These are just some of the accomplishments over the past eight years. Substantial as they are, I am even more confident that the days ahead will be even better. We will continue to enhance our services, improve our City, and enhance our quality of life.

I extend my gratitude and appreciation to all of you who find a way to volunteer your valuable time to make Chesterfield what is now regarded as one of the finest communities in the Country. It is because of you that I gave the City the motto of being the "City of Volunteers." Simply stated, because of your devotion to your community, your City, your schools, the kids' sports teams, and many other worthwhile endeavors, we are a great community for all ages.

With my gratitude for your support in the recent election to continue the work in which we have been engaged to move Chesterfield forward, I renew my commitment to each of you that every day – every day – we will be working to make Chesterfield an even better place to be.

Police Department News

Chesterfield Police Department receives CALEA Flagship Status

he Chesterfield Police Department recently completed their bid for a second re-accreditation as an Internationally Accredited Police Department. After an extensive review and examination of the Police Department's policies, practices, and procedures by three accreditation assessors, the team completed a comprehensive report on the Chesterfield Police Department. Their findings were submitted to the full Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA).

During a conference held in Raleigh, North Carolina, Chief Ray Johnson, Lt. Steven Lewis, Mayor John Nations and City Administrator Michael Herring appeared before a commission hearing during which the City was lauded for their perfect on-site inspection and received the designation as a CALEA Flagship Agency. The Commission Chairperson commented that in his four years as a Chair for CALEA hearings, he had never had an agency presented before him that had a perfect on-site inspection.

The Flagship designation is designed to acknowledge CALEA Accredited public safety agencies that have demonstrated success in the accreditation process. The program also serves to provide other agencies seeking accreditation with examples of "best practices" on how to address compliance, policy development, file maintenance, and other issues relating to the accreditation process. The Chesterfield Police Department is currently the only Flagship police agency in the State of Missouri.

"Tip a Cop" Fundraiser a Success for Special Olympics

he Chesterfield Police Department raised over \$2,000 for the Missouri Special Olympics by participating in the "Tip a Cop" fund raiser held at Red Robin in Chesterfield. All proceeds went to benefit the Missouri Special Olympics, whose mission is to provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with mental disabilities.

Chesterfield Police Lieutenant Completes FBI Academy

ieutenant Steven Lewis of the Chesterfield Police Department graduated March 20th from the FBI National Academy Program at Quantico, Virginia as part of the 236th Session. Lt. Lewis was selected from a number of candidates from the St. Louis area law enforcement community, and was joined by two other Lieutenants in the region from Creve Coeur and the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. Six other members of the Command staff of Chesterfield have attended the Academy.

Internationally known for its academic excellence, the National Academy Program, held at the FBI Academy, offers 10 weeks of advanced investigative, management, and fitness training for selected officers having proven records as professionals within their agencies. On average, officers have 19 years of law enforcement experience and usually return to their agencies to serve in executive-level positions. The standards of the Academy include rigorous academic and physical requirements. The entire cost for the Academy is funded through the FBI.

Lt. Lewis excelled in all areas of performance and now joins the FBI National Associates Chapter of the Eastern District of Missouri, which is comprised of local law enforcement executives who have graduated from the FBI National Academy.

City Of Chesterfield Fireworks Ordinance

s the Fourth of July approaches many people will enjoy the holiday with back yard barbecues, swimming, family fun and other summer activities. However, it's important to know that a Chesterfield City ordinance has long prohibited individuals from either selling or discharging fireworks, except by permit. Fireworks can be dangerous at times and can cause both personal injury and property damage. The Chesterfield Ordinance pertaining to fireworks reads as follows:

- (a) It is unlawful for any person to manufacture, sell, offer for sale, ship or cause to be shipped into the corporate limits of the City of Chesterfield, any item of fireworks. This section applies to nonresidents as well as residents of the City.
- (b) Any person possessing or transporting special fireworks into the corporate limits of the City of Chesterfield for the purpose of conducting a special fireworks display shall be licensed by the state fire marshal as a distributor in accordance with Section 320.126 RSMo. 1985, as amended.
- (c) Before any permit for a special fireworks display shall be issued by the City Administrator, the fair association, amusement park, organization, firm, or corporation making the application therefore shall furnish proof of financial responsibility to satisfy claims for damages to property or personal injuries arising out of any act or omission on the part of such person, firm or corporation or any agent or employee thereof.

Sec. 13-23. Explosion, ignition, discharge unlawful.

It is unlawful for any person to explode, ignite or discharge any articles of fireworks within the corporate limits of the City.

Did you know that Chesterfield is actually home to a fully accredited zoological park? The Sophia M. Sachs Butterfly House, a division of the Missouri Botanical Garden, is one of only four in Missouri accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums, along with the St. Louis Zoo, Kansas City Zoo and Dickerson Park Zoo in Springfield. It is the only accredited zoological facility dedicated entirely to invertebrates and their critical impact on native habitats and humans.

Nearly two million guests have visited the Butterfly House, located in the heart of Chesterfield in Faust Park. Butterfly pupae are received weekly from tropical farms. New butterflies are hatched each week, so there's always something new to see. If you've never been, you're missing a spectacular sight and learning experience for all ages. The Butterfly House is open 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. Lower Your Taxes through Energy Efficiencies

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is offering a tax deduction for the cost of a home energy audit which must be conducted by an auditor certified by the DNR or the cost of implementing any of the recommendations made by such an audit beginning with the 2009 tax year. Also, Federal tax credits are available at 30% of the cost, up to \$1,500 in 2009 and 2010 for installing efficient new windows, doors, roofs, insulation and HVAC equipment in your home. With passage of Prop P in 2004, residents voted their values and approved a sales tax to fund improvements to the Chesterfield Valley Athletic Complex, Central Park and the Family Aquatic Center. A new project is being planned to connect residents to these recreation areas by focusing on human-scale connections like sidewalks, bike lanes, and trails. Through increasing access by foot and bike, residents will have new opportunities to engage in active lifestyles and see increased health benefits and reduced traffic. The City of Chesterfield has partnered with Trailnet, a regional leader in creating healthy and active communities, to develop a bicycle and pedestrian master plan for the entire City.

Creating a bikeable and walkable environment doesn't just happen overnight. The process can take years, but with a bicycle and pedestrian master plan in place, Chesterfield can phase improvement projects over time to maximize the benefit to the community. The plan will focus on safety and connectivity, linking residents to parks, schools, local shops and businesses, and other amenities through an interconnected network of trails, onstreet bike facilities such as bike routes and bike lanes, and sidewalks and crosswalks.

The first public forum will be held on June 17, 2009 from 5:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Chesterfield City Hall. The forum will be an opportunity to learn more about what makes a community walkable and bikeable and to share your thoughts, ideas and experiences of bicycling and walking in Chesterfield. Your input will help create a vision to guide the planning process and develop a plan that meets the needs of the community. All interested community members are urged to attend.
